The tactical principles discussed and the technical processes described should not be mistaken for those of the United States Army, although many close similarities are apparent. It is not intended in the least to suggest methods of employing our own chemical warfare troops, except so far as knowledge of the enemy may contribute to effective counteraction. The study consists of a digest, with interpretations, of a great many writings of the enemy. Much of the material already has been published in isolated articles or given limited distribution in several forms. All information has been assembled here, however, and primarily focused upon the subject of tactics in chemical warfare. In addition, reports have been included of actual examples of the use of chemical warfare tactics by the enemy in the present war. Where such examples have been avail able these tend to confirm that the written tactical doctrine is generally followed in combat. A literal translation of foreign documents often gives wrong impressions to readers not acquainted with the language or practices of the originator. On the other hand, the use of the accepted terminology of our own Chemical Warfare Service would perhaps mislead the reader into the assumption that enemy techniques correspond more closely to our own than is the case. Therefore, enemy theory and practices have been stated as nearly as possible in those United States equivalents which convey the ideas, but do not necessarily represent the actual language either of enemy military writing or of the United States Army. In discussing chemical warfare it is not always possible to separate tactics from technique. In general tactics means the determination of the time and place for the use of chemical agents in conjunction with the employment of combat troops. Technique can be defined as the methods by which chemical agents are dispersed at the proper time upon the targets that tactical considerations have selected.

In many cases in chemical warfare, the two are so closely linked that it is necessary to understand the techniques used or available, to comprehend fully the tactics that may be used in a given situation. The diagrams and sketches, also, are taken from enemy publications. All have been redrawn for clarity and intelligibility. The Japanese tactical diagrams, however, are like nothing usually found in the military writings of western nations. They have been copied and clarified only as the requirements of reproduction demanded. Consequently, the Germans may, when forming a task force, use ordinary troops with a small cadre of mountaineers in relatively easy mountain terrain, but in alpine regions they use mountain troops exclusively. However, in the field of chemical warfare, the employment of toxic gases represents only one phase of modern combat technique. The use of screening smokes, incendiaries, and flamethrowers has played an increasingly important role in the present conflict and may easily assume proportions never dreamed of in the last war. The value of smoke for screening purposes in military operations has been demonstrated repeatedly. Early in the war, with the aid of this weapon, the Germans were enabled to capture the strategic Fort Eben Emael in Belgium and to penetrate the heavily fortified French Maginot Line with relatively few casualties. Aided by protective smoke screens, large numbers of Axis troops were dropped by parachute on Crete. That smoke is invaluable inlanding operations was demonstrated by the British in the Dieppe raid and by U. S. troops in North Africa. In addition, screening smokes are being utilized advantageously to obscure harbors, docks, and industrial areas when they are subjected to bombing attacks. Air raids upon London, Berlin, and other cities emphasize the importance of incendiary bombs. Especially when used together with aerial demolition bombs, these incendiaries have caused widespread destruction of builtup areas. The tactical value of the flamethrower against pill boxes and fixed emplacements is recognized. It is a particularly effective weapon when mounted on tanks.
